These **important role models** teach our youth to reach high and dream big to become whatever they choose.

There are **many places** in the Mount Vernon District that you can visit this month to **celebrate women**. Stroll the **Workhouse Arts Center** featuring many female artists and the **Lucy Burns Museum** that tells the compelling story of the suffragists who were imprisoned there in 1917 for demanding the right to vote. Visit the **Woodlawn Plantation**, home of George Washington's step granddaughter and preserver of his legacy Eleanor "Nelly" Custis, for the 56<sup>th</sup> Annual Needlework Show and Sale. Then, stop by **Occoquan Regional Park** to see the future home of the **Turning Point Suffragist Memorial**.

It is unfortunate that as we **recognize the important contributions** of women in our society, the Virginia House refused to allow the **Equal Rights Amendment (ERA)** to come to the floor for a vote. Congress passed the ERA in 1972 and sent it to the states for ratification, where it needed 38 of the 50 states to approve the measure. **Virginia had the opportunity this year to make history** and finally give all individuals equal rights under, our Constitution. What are the men in the Virginia Senate so afraid of? There appears to be **overwhelming support in the Commonwealth and around the nation** for this to pass. I hope lawmakers will come together at the next General Assembly session to get this **important piece of legislation passed**.

On a more positive note, I would like to introduce the County's **newest Deputy County Executive.** Rachel O'Dwyer Flynn will oversee the Department of Public Works and Environmental Services, the Department of Transportation, the Park Authority, the Department of Code Compliance, Land Development Services and a future agency that will combine the Department of Planning and Zoning and the Office of Community Revitalization. Ms. Flynn has **35 years of experience** in both private and public organizations as an architect, urban planner, director of planning/building/economic development and as a real estate development executive. She is the **former director** of design management, planning and entitlements at **Google**, and from 2016-18, she was the **vice president of FivePoint Communities**. Read more.

## **Summer Metrorail Closures**

Metro announces travel options, customer website for Blue/Yellow line customers affected by summer platform reconstruction work

Starting Saturday, May 25, the six Blue and Yellow line stations south of Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport will be closed for full platform reconstruction and major station improvements.



In collaboration with regional officials and transportation agencies, Metro has released travel alternatives and a detailed project website - wmata.com/platforms - to help customers begin planning for this summer's closure. To expedite construction and minimize customer inconvenience, the six stations-Braddock Road, King Street, Eisenhower Ave, Huntington, Van Dorn Street, and Franconia-Springfield-will be closed from Saturday, May 25 to Monday, September 2, 2019, to allow for around-the-clock work. Metro plans an extensive network of free express and local shuttle bus services to help customers get around the region during construction. Read more...

The officers and staff at the Mount Vernon Police District Station began the new year with a renewed commitment to **engaging and protecting our community**. Their focus


continues to be on **crime fighting and prevention efforts**, as well as driver and pedestrian safety.

## **Chestnut Tree Blight and Restoration**

Very few people remember mature American chestnut trees, but before the introduction of a disease called chestnut blight, approximately 25 percent of the trees in eastern North American forests were American chestnuts. The trees grew fast and large and produced tons of valuable fruits. They provided food for wildlife, livestock and

people and were an important part of the economy, particularly in rural Appalachia. The **wood was strong** and **rot resistant** and was used for lumber, fencing, furniture, railroad ties and crafts. Read more...
