Early Childhood Programs and Services (ECPS) is dedicated to the care, education, and healthy development of children, from birth through elementary school age. ECPS collaborates with early childhood professionals, families, schools, and community partners to support children in reaching their fullest potential. In partnership with the community, schools, and county, ECPS coordinates the implementation of the Fairfax County Equitable School Readiness Strategic Plan (ESRSP).

Providing access to affordable, quality early childhood education is a two-generational strategy

which supports parents' workforce participation while also preparing young children for lifelong success. Young children who begin kindergarten with a strong social, emotional, and cognitive foundation are more likely to do well in school, become employed and less likely to experience negative health factors. Expanding the County's equitable early childhood system advances the goal of the Board of Supervisors to ensure that every child in Fairfax County has equitable opportunities to thrive.

- 5,800 children were served by the Child Care Assistance and Referral Program (CCAR).
- Served over 500 children in Virginia Preschool Initiative (VPI) Community Programs.

# NCS GOAL: Support health and wellbeing.

#### **ESRSP Strategies:**

Establish meaningful partnerships with families to grow school readiness opportunities in all communities and support children's optimal development in all settings.

#### **ESRSP Actions:**

- Established Access and Family Partnerships.
- Expanding ASQ® Initiative.
- Meeting Head Start benchmarks.

#### **IMPACTS: -**

- Partnered with community to establish Family Council.
- Increasing awareness and use of ASQ® and early identification/ interventions.
- Ready Region Capital Area (RRCA) completed 2,771 observations for quality interactions at 665 child care programs in the RRCA.
- Head Start Benchmarks FY23:
  - 93% of 4-year-olds reached benchmarks in social-emotional skills.
  - 91% of 4-year-olds reached benchmarks in literacy and language skills.
  - 89% of 4-year-olds reached benchmarks in math skills.

## NCS GOAL: Facilitate economic security & resiliency.

# **ESRSP Strategies:**

- Provide equitable offerings of highquality early development and learning experiences and related school readiness supports throughout the county.
- Promote equityfocused planning and decision making, shared accountability, by using data.

### **ESRSP Actions:**

- Institute for Early Learning (IFEL), CEPS and VQB5 coordination of trainings to support VQB5.
- Targeted and meaningful training opportunities offered.
- Early Childhood Supply and Access Gaps map

#### **IMPACTS: -**

- 2,857 Educators received training from the ECPS IFEL.
- Provided technical assitance to 832 locally permitted family child care homes.
- Used access gap map to inform capital improvement plans for child care programs.

#### **Economic Environment:**

# What our families have to say!

A CCAR client recently shared that her family--including her two daughters--had faced significant challenges and countless obstacles for years, including homelessness, transportation issues and unemployment. For her,

"the only constant thing that has always remained is Early Childhood Programs and Service's (ECPS) support, helping me with affordable child care while I pull myself up after every hurdle that's been placed in front of me. I can't put into words how much that has meant to me."

She credited the case managers with making sure she turned in her recertification on time. The support from CCAR and ECPS enabled her to attend school, participate in training to obtain IT certifications, and ultimately secure a position as a Computer Software Integration Analyst for the federal government. She concluded, "You all have made a big impact in my life and most importantly my children's life by helping their mom be able to finally take care of them on her own."

- In FY23, ECPS worked with our non-profit partner Fairfax Futures to increase developmentally appropriate practices for child care Educators using the Ages & Stages Questionnaire®.
- In collaboration with the Virginia Early Childhood Foundation (VECF) and the Virginia Department of Education, ECPS led the Ready Region Capital Area to support building a unified early childhood system in the community.
- Continued the close partnership with Fairfax County Public Schools to implement Ready Regions work, Head Start and coordination to increase early childhood access in the County.
