
Current Comprehensive Plan Guidance on Active Transportation and Trails

- >> Multiple comprehensive plans with sometimes differing facility type guidance
 - Countywide Trails Plan originally adopted in 1976, last updated in 2018
 - Bicycle Master Plan adopted in 2014
 - Multiple Area Plans contain additional bicycle and pedestrian recommendations (updated every 20 years)
- >> Some facilities and design recommendations are outdated and no longer meet national and VDOT standards
- >> No countywide pedestrian specific recommendations
- >> No active transportation safety recommendations
- >> Draft Countywide Strategic Plan emphasizes need for active transportation facility and safety improvements



Background: Recent Changes in Bicycle Transportation Planning / Engineering

- National best practices and engineering standards are shifting from on-street bicycle facilities to separated or offstreet facilities along busy roadways
- New AASHTO Bikeway Design Guide to be released in fall 2020

All Ages and Abilities (AAA) Bike Facilities

Rule #1: Build the types of cycling facilities that feel comfortable for all **Level of Comfort** More 1 Less Protected Bike Local Street Off-Street Unsuitable for AAA facility Suitable for AAA facility


Many types of traditional bike facilities only appeal to people who are comfortable riding in traffic. However, bikeways on quiet streets, protected bike lanes, and off-street pathways appeal to people who are interested in cycling but concerned for their safety.2

The general approaches to creating AAA cycling routes on city streets are:

- Ensuring low motor vehicle speeds and volumes on local streets, or
- Providing physical separation on busy streets

New National Guidance on Bicycle Facility Selection



Regional Shared Use Path Network

- Shared Use Paths or "Trails" were not seen as preferred bicycle facilities since the 1980s nationwide, therefore implementation and integration of the Countywide Trails Plan into Area Planning efforts has been spotty
- Driven by successful urban trails such as the Indianapolis Cultural Trail, developing regional trail networks is emerging as a national best practice once again to improve access and economic opportunities for people of all ages and abilities
- Last year, parts of Fairfax County's existing and planned trail network became part of the regional Capital Trails Network




ActiveFairfax Plan



- Board of Supervisors approved \$300,000 in July 2019 to begin community engagement and data collection
- Additional funding needed to complete comprehensive plan amendment and plan development

ActiveFairfax Plan Key Project Goals

- ✓ Reconcile bicycle, area and trails plans
- ✓ Bring planned active transportation and countywide trails network recommendations up to current standards, identify and address network gaps
- ✓ Provide active transportation facility selection toolkit for new roads and area planning efforts
- ✓ Provide active transportation safety recommendations
- ✓ Provide implementation, policy and program recommendations and guidance




