Clean Out Your Medicine Cabinets

We are now starting the drug take back program at 8:00 a.m. and ending collection at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 29.

On **Saturday**, **April 29 from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.** the Sully District Police Station and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public an opportunity to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your pills for disposal to the lobby of 4900 Stonecroft Boulevard, Chantilly, VA 20151.

The DEA cannot accept liquids, needles, or sharps, ONLY pills or patches. The service is free and anonymous. No questions asked.


Free Carseat Inspections



Certified technicians from the Sully District Police Station will perform free, child safety carseat inspections Thursday, April 27, from 5:00 to 8:30 p.m., at the station, 4900 Stonecroft Boulevard in Chantilly. No appointment is

necessary. Residents should install the child safety seats themselves so technicians may properly inspect and adjust them, as needed. Because of time constraints, only the first 35 vehicles arriving on each date will be inspected. That allows inspectors enough time to properly instruct the caregiver on the correct use of the child seat. Call 703-814-7000, ext. 5140, to confirm dates and times.

New Homelessness Count: Under 1,000 Milestone is Reached



We have reached a significant milestone in our efforts to decrease the number of people who are homeless in our county! For the first time in the nine years that Fairfax County has been reporting our annual Point In Time Count, less than 1,000 people were reported as being homeless.

On the night of January 25, there were 964 people who were homeless in the Fairfax County and Falls Church area.

- 474 were people in families, including 286 children
- 490 people were single individuals, including 155 older adults, ages 55 and over

Homelessness in our county has decreased 47 percent since 2008. This represents 871 fewer people counted as homeless on one night in January 2017 than on one night in January 2008. The count is made following federal guidelines and covers people who are literally homeless – those who are in shelters, in time-limited transitional housing programs, or unsheltered and living on the street.

A Partnership to End Homelessness:

Why are we seeing these decreasing numbers? Contributing reasons include a countywide emphasis on homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing, as well as an unified approach to homeless services with the county's <u>nonprofit</u> and <u>community partners</u>, according to Dean Klein, director of the Office to Prevent and End Homelessness.

The Point in Time Count was conducted in coordination with the entire Metro Washington, D.C. region; all the local jurisdictions' (and throughout Virginia) counts were done on January 25. More information from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Overall, there was a 2 percent increase in crime in 2016 as compared to 2015. This was due in part to significant increases in narcotics offenses, which saw the largest gains. Colonel Edwin C. Roessler Jr., Chief of Police, says, "The mission of the Fairfax County Police Department is to prevent and fight crime through community engagement and information sharing, and it is this partnership that keeps Fairfax County the safest jurisdiction of its size in the United States."

Here's How to Report Those Pesky Potholes



Potholes.

They are a way of life on the roads especially in the early spring months. Please report potholes you encounter! Your car will thank you.

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) maintains most primary and secondary roads in the county and fixes potholes. You can <u>look up who maintains every road</u> in the county.

VDOT's new online reporting tool makes it easier to pinpoint exactly where you see a pothole. You can also report potholes directly from your mobile device and include images (**but NOT while driving!).

Report Potholes to VDOT

You also can call VDOT at 1-800-FOR-ROAD (1-800-367-7623) to report potholes or to ask who maintains a road.

Potholes on Roads VDOT Does Not Maintain:

VDOT does not maintain all major roads in the area, however. If you see potholes on these roads:

- Dulles Toll Road, contact the Washington Metropolitan Airports
 Authority.
- GW Parkway, contact the National Park Service.
- Many private roads are maintained by businesses, apartment/condo complexes, homeowner/civic associations or residents. If you know there is a pothole on a road that is privately maintained, contact your HOA or the business that is responsible.

Community Conversation on Youth Suicide Prevention



The more a community knows about suicide, the better equipped it is to prevent such tragic deaths. According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control, suicide is the third leading cause of death for youth between the ages of 10 and 24 and results in approximately 4,600 young lives lost each year.

On April 27, you are invited to join the <u>Fairfax-Falls Church Community</u> <u>Services Board</u> (CSB) and the NEXUS committee for a "community conversation" about youth suicide, including local prevention initiatives and life-saving strategies. NEXUS is a committee of the Advisory Board to the CSB's Joe and Fredona Gartlan Center.

The event takes place on **Thursday, April 27, from 1:30 to 4:00 p.m**. at <u>Fairfax County Public Schools' Virginia Hills Center</u>, 6500 Diana Lane, Alexandria, VA 22310.

You will learn about:

- Youth suicide warning signs
- Evidence-based risk assessments, safety plans and treatment options
- How to access <u>CSB emergency services</u> and other <u>behavioral health</u> resources
- Free, online training courses in youth suicide prevention skills
- Mental Health First Aid courses
- Online, confidential mental health assessments

The forum also features a presentation by Lisa M. Horowitz, Ph.D., MPH, of the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), on recent evidence-based research tools for detecting depression and suicidal outcomes among youth.

Tisha Deeghan, Executive Director of the CSB, will facilitate a panel of local experts addressing prevention efforts, youth mental wellness and other local behavioral health initiatives. Panelists include:

Emergency Response Education

The next available Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Class is scheduled to begin on Monday, April 24 at the Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Academy. There are two sessions each week on Mondays and Wednesdays that run until May 17. The class is 28 hours in length, plus the final practical exercise. The program educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area. CERT trains county residents in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. Using the training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT members can assist others in their neighborhood or workplace following an event when professional responders are not immediately available to help. CERT members also are encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking a more active role in emergency preparedness projects in their community. By applying to this opportunity, it acts a marker that will allow you to receive the CERT emails and notifications for upcoming classes.
