There are 10 locations around the County where you can vote in-person absentee, including the Sully Governmental Center. More information about Election Day and what is on the ballot, is below.

- In-person Absentee Voting at the Office of Elections (12000 Government Center Parkway, Conference Rooms 2/3, Fairfax, VA 22035): Last weekday today, Friday, Nov. 1 from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. and Saturday, Nov. 2 from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- In-person Absentee Voting at satellite locations: Last weekday today, Friday, Nov. 1 from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.; and Saturday, November 2 from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- November 2, 2019: Final day to vote absentee in-person by 5:00 p.m.

What You Need to Know for Election Day on November 5



Election Day is less than a week away, and here are three things you need to know if you plan to vote on Tuesday, November 5, 2019 in Fairfax County.

1. Know What is on the Ballot

The following offices are on the ballot:

- Fairfax County <u>Board of Supervisors</u>
- Fairfax County <u>School Board</u>
- Fairfax County Sheriff
- Fairfax Commonwealth's Attorney
- Virginia State Senate
- Virginia House of Delegates
- Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation Directors

There is also a \$360 million school bond referendum on the ballot that if passes is planned to be used to design, build, or renovate schools.

2. Know Your Polling Place

Not sure where you vote? Look it up on the Virginia Department of Elections portal.

Polls are open in Virginia from 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. If you are planning to vote on your way home from work, keep in mind you need to be in line at your poll location by 7:00 p.m. in order to vote - give yourself plenty of travel time.

3. Know That You Need to Bring Your ID

There are several forms of <u>acceptable photo ID</u>, including:

- Virginia driver's license
- U.S. passport
- Military ID
- Federal, Virginia, or local government-issued photo ID cards
- ID issued by a Virginia college or university

Finally, the last day to absentee vote in person is Saturday, November 2, 2019 at 5:00 p.m. There are <u>10 locations</u> that are open; in Virginia, you <u>must have a reason to vote absentee.</u>

2019 School Bond Referendum

A school bond referendum will be on the general election ballot **Tuesday, November 5, 2019**. Polls will be open from 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Residents of Fairfax County may vote if they are 18 years of age or older on Election Day and have registered to vote 22 days prior to the election (on or before October 15, 2019).

What is a Bond?:

The sale of municipal bonds is a form of long-term borrowing that spreads the cost of major capital improvements over the years facilities are used. This method of financing ensures that current and future users help pay for the improvements.

Why Are Bonds Needed?:


The building and renovation of schools are not financed through the school system's operating funds, but through bonds. Similar to an individual or a family obtaining a mortgage on a residence to spread the cost of home buying over a number of years, bonds spread the cost of major capital improvements over a number of years.

If approved, these bonds will probably be sold to large investment banking syndicates that will have to competitively bid for them. Once bought, they are typically resold to financial institutions, which then sell them to investors.

Why a Referendum?:

The law requires that voters approve bonds since they are a future obligation for taxpayers. As long as debt service costs do not increase significantly as a percentage of combined general fund disbursements, the county's bonded debt will not be a contributing factor to any increase in local taxes.

VDOT: Route 29 Northbound Over Cub Run Bridge Rehabilitation

Location: Bull Run Elementary School (15301 Lee Highway, Centreville, VA 20121)

Find out about plans to rehabilitate the northbound Route 29 (Lee Highway) bridge over Cub Run to improve safety and extend the overall life of the bridge. The bridge was built in 1954.

The planned improvements include: replacing the concrete deck, installing steel beams, rebuilding the concrete pedestals, replacing the bridge bearings, and repairing cracks.

Stop by between 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. to view displays and learn more about the project. A presentation will begin at 7:00 p.m. Project staff will be available to answer your questions.



Help is Available to Prevent Opioid Overdoses



In Fairfax County, more people die from overdoses than car accidents. We have a <u>plan</u> to combat the opioid epidemic here in Fairfax County, but we need your help as well. Below is what you need to know if you or somebody close to you might be impacted by this crisis.

Getting Help-

• If the situation is immediately life-threatening, call 9-1-1. Our Fire and Rescue personnel carry medication that can prevent death from opioid overdose.

- Call the <u>Fairfax Detoxification Center</u> at 703-502-7000; available 24/7, including weekends and holidays. The center includes a mobile team called <u>Detox Diversion</u> that is available between 3:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. daily. They respond to police and community requests to intervene at the scene of a potential arrest to instead refer the individual to detoxification services.
- Call the <u>Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board</u> (CSB) during business hours at 703-383-8500. Their staff can help you find appropriate treatment and recovery resources.
- Youth and adults can also come in person, without a prior appointment, to <u>Entry & Referral Services</u> at the CSB's <u>Merrifield Center</u>, Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. to be screened for services. Youth walk-in evaluations are offered during these times and also until 7:00 p.m. on Tuesdays.

What You Can Do -

We need your help to fight this crisis as a community. Here are a few ways you can make a difference:

- Sign up for a <u>REVIVE! training</u>. The classes train individuals on what to do and not do in an overdose situation, how to administer naloxone, and what to do afterward.
- Learn how to properly dispose of medications.
- Complete an Overdose Safety Plan for either yourself or a friend in need.
- Get a <u>free medication lock box</u> from the CSB.

Water Conservation is Everyone's Job

Water supplies in the Northern Virginia area are more than adequate to meet current needs, but it may not be that way in the future. This valuable resource must be conserved and protected.

Conservation Saves Money:

Conserving water can mean substantial savings in sewer, energy, and water bills. For homeowners with septic systems, conserving water reduces wear and tear on the system and requires less energy for pumping well water.

Widespread reduction in water use can also mean a reduced need for new or expanded sewer treatment facilities. Tax dollars saved by not expanding existing facilities could be used to improve water treatment techniques.

Make a Difference:

- Use low flow faucets and showerheads, reduced flow toilet flushing equipment, and water saving dish and clothes washers.
- Check for water leaks.
- Take short showers instead of full tub baths. Avoid letting faucets run unnecessarily.
- Only use fully loaded dish and clothes washers.
- Install a rain barrel or cistern to capture rain water for reuse.
- Wash cars only when necessary. Use a bucket and a spray nozzle to save water.
- Go to a commercial car wash that uses water efficiently and disposes of runoff properly.
- Water lawns at the coolest part of the day to avoid evaporation. Use slow watering techniques such as trickle irrigation or a soaker hose.
- Use mulch to hold in soil moisture.
- Do not over-water lawns or gardens.
